family were visiting with her grandparents Joe and Sue Cyr at Cold Stream Pond in 2011, Gigi became ill and appeared to be suffering from a burst appendix, so they went to Penobscot Valley Hospital in Lincoln. Given that PVH does not have a pediatric surgeon, the doctor sent her by ambulance to EMMC.

Soon after her surgery was underway it became clear to the doctor at EMMC that Gigi was not suffering from appendicitis. They noticed an abnormal twisting of her small intestine, which cut off the blood flow to her small intestine. During the three-hour surgery, a large portion of her small intestine was removed. Her surgeons at EMMC saved Gigi. The nurses and pediatric support team were extremely supportive to her family. Gigi has since undergone additional surgeries to help her. She is doing well now and incredibly grateful to the doctors and staff at EMMC for saving her life twice.

Gigi's favorite place in the world is Cold Stream Pond....and many of us feel the same way. We are pleased to be able to help Gigi.

Loon Report by Monique Landucci, Loon Count Coordinator

Volunteers across the state have been rising early on "Loon Count Day" (always the third Saturday in July) and counting all the loons they can find on their assigned section of our lake from 7:00 to 7:30 a.m. Our final count for 2013 was 20 adults and 1 chick. However, one of our loon counters observed four loons flying that did not land and possibly were not counted. Based on the time and other loons counted, I do believe that these four flying loons should be counted.

This year we also began tracking how the loons were observed, whether they were isolated, in pairs or a group and also whether nests were seen. We counted 5 individual pairs (one was an adult and chick) and one group of 3 loons, all the rest were isolated.

Water Quality Grant

Water quality protection is our most important task as an association. A \$1,500 Water Quality Grant is awarded annual by the Cold Stream Campowners Association for projects that address water quality issues on the camp roads. Qualified projects may include: ditching, culverts, storm water management, and tree removal. All those living on a Cold Stream Pond camp roads are eligible. Anyone looking to complete projects that will help improve a current water shed issue is encouraged to apply. All applications are reviewed by the Grant Committee, Code Enforcement, and Penobscot County Soil & Water

Lakes & Shores - Healthy Lake

Conservation. The project(s) having the greatest impact on watershed, as determined by PCS&W, will be awarded all or a portion of the grant money.

Loon Nesting Platforms: Your Help is Needed

Living on Cold Stream Pond, loon calls echoing across the water are a familiar and haunting part of lake life. It is a pleasure to be able to observe these ancient birds arrive as the ice goes out, establish their territories, nest, and produce chicks. As newcomers to Cold Stream Pond this spring, my husband and I

were fortunate to share with the other homeowners at the north end of the lake the appearance of a loon pair with a chick. We were able to watch this chick daily with its parents until sadly, the chick disappeared, likely lost to a predator such as a turtle or bird of prey. Others who have been here longer worry that fewer chicks are being successfully raised. This concern has led to an interest in establishing nesting platforms.

Besides predation, in recent years, heavy rainfalls and the artificial control of water level in lakes has presented a challenge to the loon population in Maine. The loon, a heavy-bodied diving duck, has very limited locomotive power on land and must choose nesting sites close to the water. Hence, nests



are often vulnerable to changing water levels and eggs are often lost before hatching. With high water levels, eggs can float away or pairs can abandon a nest. With low water levels, the nest may become too distant from the water for the loons to reach it. As a result, although the adult loon population in Maine continues to show a steady increase, there has not been a corresponding increase in chicks. Maine is fortunate to have a greater number of loons than any other state in the Northeast, with a count of 3,220 adults in 2010, almost double the count from the mid-1980's. However, the chick population has fluctuated from between 400 and 150 with no trend toward increase.

One effort to increase the number of successful nests involves the placement of nesting platforms. These platforms are cedar log rafts loaded with a supply of nesting materials anchored in the territory of breeding pair that has not been successful in producing chicks. In New Hampshire, where there has been concern about the loon population for years, nesting platforms have produced 21% of the chicks successfully hatched between 1977 and 2005. The Cold Stream Pond Campowner's Association has been considering the placement of nesting platforms or rafts to increase the number of successful nests on this lake. The chart below demonstrates the relative number of adults and chicks counted on Cold Stream Pond since 2001. There has been a fluctuation in the number of adults counted, but there does appear to be a trend toward fewer chicks on the lake.

Because nesting platforms have been studied on a number of lakes, some clear guidelines for placing platforms have been established. 1) rafts should be placed only in identified territories (defended by a pair for at least 4 weeks a year for 3 years); 2) rafts should be protected from wind and waves; 3) rafts should be away from extensive shoreline development; and 4) rafts should avoid routes used heavily by motorized or self-propelled crafts. The Maine Audubon Society suggests observing a pair for several years to determine if they are nesting unsuccessfully or are not an breeding pair.



Region F Wildlife Report

Enclosed is an excerpt from MDIFW's Research and Management Report 2013 as authored by Charlie Todd; Endangered and Threatened Species Coordinator (and previously long-time eagle biologist).

For the first time since the bald eagle was delisted in Maine in 2009, MDIFW conducted a

statewide survey of nesting bald eagles. Wildlife staff including Region F wildlife biologists here in Enfield flew a combination of known nests (prior to 2008), known new nests (since 2008), and conducted shoreline searches along lakes, ponds, rivers, and coastline across the state. The 2008 survey effort tallied a total of 477 pairs statewide, the 2013 effort yielded a minimum count of 630 nesting pairs, an increase of 153 nesting pairs across the State of Maine.

Nests were monitored for eagle residency and breeding activity from mid-March to early-May. Occupied nests were rechecked in June



and early-July to evaluate nesting success and number of fledgling eaglets. Many nests in the Lincoln Lakes Region and nearby Penobscot River were active. Nesting productivity statewide during the 2013 effort exceeded 0.8 fledglings per nesting pair; an indication that diminished regulatory protection after being delisted had not handicapped eagle reproduction here in Maine.

In summary, MDIFW biologists and game warden pilots checked the vicinity of 1,637 individual nest locations found during a 50-year monitoring effort in Maine, these were located in 689 different nesting territories. In total, 153 new nests were located in 2013. Forty-one were in new nesting territories, and 112 were alternate nest locations of established pairs that had shifted locations since previous monitoring efforts.

A federal law, the Bald Eagle-Golden Eagle Protection Act now serves as the primary legal standard for bald eagles in Maine. MDIFW staff continues to provide technical assistance to landowners and conservation partners. Agencies and cooperators now own or hold easements to protect at least 250 eagle nest territories in Maine. This "safety net" helps to defend some eagles from constant threats on shoreline habitats that can be related to weather, aging nest trees, or human-impacts.
