

Exhibitions



As we herald the institutional title of Leeds Arts University, the latest Exhibitions programme is launched across our gallery and display spaces. The August-December 2017 programme continues to showcase research-practice, both generated from within and beyond.

Our first two exhibitions investigate surrealism's legacies. At Vernon Street Gallery, Anthony Earnshaw's playful interests in the aftermath of the surrealist movement is entitled The Distribution of Wishes. This is mirrored up the road in The Blenheim Walk Gallery with the research-exhibition Laurence Figgis: (After) After. Developing the mid-twentieth century visual methods of Picasso and Rauschenberg, Figgis's visual narratives combine picturebook illustrations and fairy tales to retell the art history of postmodernism in 2017.

Seasonal highlights from later in the programme include illustrations by Matthew the Horse, concept art from The Snowman, and astrophotography by alumna Melanie King.

Our two masters programmes contribute to the rich variety of Exhibitions in the autumn term, including the multifaceted end of year show from MA Creative Practice in October, and a December work-in-progress Contexts of Practice show from our new MA in Curation Practices.

Finally, Curator's Choice has a particular focus on circus, fairground and carnivalesque imagery with participating artists including: Glasgow-based painter Sharon Thomas, MA Creative Practice graduating photographer Mel Dewey, graduating performance artist Liliana Robins, and narrative artist and lecturer Garry Barker among others.

Laurence Figgis

(After) After

Laurence Figgis: (After) After re-presents postmodernism as a perverse fairy tale. Figgis is an artist, writer and Lecturer in Fine Art Painting and Printmaking at The Glasgow School of Art (GSA), working in collage and with text/image relationships. With research-practice focusing on Rauschenberg's Dante drawings (1958-60), Picasso's Las Meninas series (1957), as well as 1960s Ladybird Book illustrations, Figgis will reinterpret such art historical melodramas, probing the place of kitsch and anachronism in the early twenty-first century.

A new interpretation text by art historian, writer and critic Dr Susannah Thompson (GSA) will accompany the exhibition.

Forwards Always: Seasonal Observations Through Image and Word

Forwards Always presents seasonal observations through image and word. This body of work comprises 12 large-scale, screen printed fabric banners and a self-published book of poetry. Though the banners and poetry book can be seen as separate outcomes, they are connected by the same underlying principle: that their content emerged from an ongoing exploration of open mode, uninhibited play and improvisation.
