



Day Boy Enrolment Scheme

The Ministry of Education has required the College Council to put in place an enrolment scheme for applications made for entry to the College. The Council is required to work within the maximum roll under the Integration Agreement. Copies of the enrolment scheme may be obtained from the College office.

The first four priority groups set out below apply to Preferential students only. These are students with parents or guardians who have an established, particular, or general connection with the Special Character of the College. Preferential students must be willing to accept the conditions of the Special Character outlined earlier.

FIRST PRIORITY

Preferential students who are accepted in the College Boarding Hostels.

SECOND PRIORITY

Priority to Dayboy applicants for whom the school is "reasonably convenient". The Education Amendment Act accepts that the definition of "reasonably convenient" for an Integrated School such as Lindisfarne, given that we serve the Special Character needs of the Napier/Hastings district, will be greater than for a State School.

The area of reasonably convenient for a Dayboy student is that part of Hastings and Napier bounded by:

- The Esk River in the North through to Hill Road, Seafield Road, Avery Road
- Puketitiri Road up to the junction of Apley Road
- Dartmoor Road up to the junction of Apley Road
- Moteo Pa Road, Omaranui Settlement and Pirau Road
- Swamp Road between Puketapu and Omahu
- Taihape Road up to the Junction of Matapiro Road
- Matapiro Road to the Junction of Ohiti Road. Ohiti Road
- Maraekakaho Road to Maraekakaho Stream. Whakapirau Road
- Raukawa Road between Whakapirau Rd and Anaroa Road
- Burma Road
- Horonui Road
- State Highway 2, between Burma Road and Poukawa Road
- Poukawa Road and Douglas Road
- Junction Middle Road and Rowe Road. Rowe Road
- MacKenzie Road, Kahuranaki Road up to junction of MacKenzie Road
- Maraetotara, Okaihau, Tawa, and Waipoapoa Road
- Te Apiti Road Nth



LINDISFARNE COLLEGE

Should applications within this region exceed the number of places available, then the allocation of places will be made in the following order:

- a) Brothers of students who are currently attending the College or have attended;
- b) The sons of permanent staff who are employed by the College (or have worked at the College as a permanent member of staff for a period of more than three years), or the sons of Ministers who provide regular liturgy at the College Chapel services;
- c) Sons of past or present Board of Trustees or Board of Proprietors representatives, who have served as a representative for a period of more than three years;
- d) Sons of those who have had a leadership role in Lindisfarne College, such as the College Foundation and committees over an unbroken period of more than 7 years;
- e) Sons of former pupils of the College;
- f) Other Preferential Students.

In each of categories of (a)-(e) above, boys will be listed in order of receipt of their applications.

Lindisfarne College will use its "waiting list" which records the date at which applications are received. In each of the categories, available places will be offered to boys in the order in which their names occur on the waiting list for a particular year of entry.

THIRD PRIORITY

Preferential students for where their place of residence is outside the area decreed reasonably convenient. If places remain for allocation to students in this priority group, selection will be by applying the following priority order as set out in Section 11F of the Education Act 1989:

- a) First priority must be given to any applicant who is accepted for enrolment in a special programme run by the school. (This priority category is not applicable at this school because the school does not fund a special programme approved by the Secretary);
- b) Second priority must be given to any applicant who is the sibling of a current student of the school;
- c) Third priority must be given to any student who is the sibling of a former student of the school;
- d) Fourth priority must be given to any applicant who is a child of a former student of the school;
- e) Fifth priority must be given to any applicant who is either a child of an employee of the board of the school or a child of a member of the board of the school;
- f) Sixth priority must be given to all other applicants.

If there are more applicants in the second, third, fourth, fifth, or sixth priority groups than there are places available, selection within the priority group must be by ballot conducted in accordance with instructions issued by the Secretary under section 11G.



FOURTH PRIORITY

If all preferential applicants for Dayboy places can be enrolled, the college is able to enrol a limited number of non-preference students (up to 5% of the maximum number of students in any one year). Among non-preference students, priority will be given to those boys who are accepted in the College Boarding Hostels. Other non-preference students will be selected by ranking them in order of closeness to the College.

SELECTION

The selection process described for students in priority groups 1,2,3 and 4 above will operate at each year level, depending on the number of places deemed by the Rector to be available at each year level. In any year, however, very few places are likely to be available at Years 10-13.

PRE-ENROLMENT

Each year, applications for enrolment will be sought by a date which will be published in a daily or community newspaper circulating in the area served by the school. Applications for Dayboy places will not be accepted after this date. Late applications for Boarding places will be accepted for processing if applications received by the advertised date have been completed.

INFORMING PARENTS

Within 90 days of the closing date for applications, parents will be informed of their son's place on the waiting list. If places become available at a later date, places will be offered to boys in the order of their place on the waiting list until 1 March, of the year their son is seeking enrolment.
