The Global Burden of Disease Study 2023 presents a post-pandemic overview of global health, showing both recovery and remaining vulnerabilities. While life expectancy is rebounding, inequalities persist and the growing weight of non-communicable diseases poses new challenges. This session co-hosted by *the Lancet* and *the Institute for Health Metrics and Evaluation (IHME)*, will launch the *Global Burden of Disease Study 2023*, creating a basis for evidence-driven dialogue on strengthening health systems and advancing sustainable progress toward 2030 and beyond.

A Commentary by Ilona Kickbusch

Three key issues to be tackled in global health: Institutional fragility, weakened solidarity and lack of systemic action

Hardly anything is more difficult than setting global health priorities and deciding which are the most important issues to focus on. In global health we often end up thinking in terms of disease or population groups that need attention but that leads to a neglect of the systemic and structural issues which need to be tackled. So let me take a stab at 3 issues that need to be addressed urgently – but with an understanding that they cannot be solved overnight. The first is the **institutional fragility of international health organizations**, starting with the budget crisis at the World Health Organisation, which is confronting a 20% cut in funding for 2026–2027. The restructuring of the work of the organization raises concerns about the WHO's capacity to lead effectively in times when multilateralism is out of favor and new challenges loom.

Strategic Pathways for Health Cooperation in the Global South

A new commentary, shaped by discussions at the WHS Regional Meeting 2025 in New Delhi, has just been published. This publication reflects the impact of the WHS Regional Meetings, where regional voices drive global dialogue and shape the future of multilateralism.



It outlines five strategic pathways for reimagining health cooperation in the Global South:

- Prioritizing health in non-health multilateral forums such as the G20, ASEAN, and BRICS
- Strengthening South-South cooperation by sharing innovations and building collective capacity
- Moving beyond traditional donor-recipient models with innovative co-investment financing
- Leveraging the demographic dividend to expand markets
- Reinforcing domestic health systems

The conversation will continue at the WHS 2025 in Berlin on October 12-14.
