

EVIDENCE WEB OR EDUCATION

The OECD's Evidence Web for Education (EWE) aims to make the thoughtful and systematic use of evidence a reality in education policy and practice.

To keep education relevant in a changing world and make education systems more equitable and efficient, policy makers and practitioners need to embrace strategies that are well-founded and guided by the best available evidence. However, the uptake of research evidence in education remains limited in many systems – and when it is used, its application can be poor. EWE builds on the major developments in the field of knowledge mobilisation, as well as the gaps and obstacles identified in the OECD Strengthening the Impact of Education Research project. It supports evidence intermediaries (a.k.a. knowledge brokers) in improving the quality, coherence and effectiveness of their knowledge mobilisation strategies and facilitates co-ordination across them through:



Developing a structured evidence meta-portal gathering connecting existing evidence repositories - Evidence Web



Developing a resource bank of research**based tools** to support intermediaries in improving their knowledge mobilisation work - Knowledge Bridge



Offering peer learning and development activities for evidence intermediaries, to build their capacity in knowledge mobilisation and foster a peer community – Peer Learning






The OECD's **Evidence Web for Education (EWE)** aims to strengthen the global education evidence architecture by developing **a user-friendly meta-portal that connects existing evidence repositories.** This platform will help education evidence intermediaries (a.k.a. knowledge brokers), policy makers and practitioners rapidly find high-quality, policy- and practice-relevant research evidence. The creation of this platform contributes to addressing the challenges of fragmentation, duplication, and lack of transparency in current evidence ecosystems.

What is it?

During the initial development phase (2025–2026), we are piloting a meta-portal that:



How is it developed?



The project will involve close partnership and co-development with organisations hosting major education evidence repositories to ensure relevance and shared ownership. We will draw on their experience, expertise and resources.



We will conduct a comparative analysis of education evidence repositories to provide the evidence base and design rationale for the platform. The analysis extends to formats (e.g. toolkits, policy briefs), types of evidence (e.g. RCTs, implementation studies), evidence quality standards, thematic structures and comparability dimensions (e.g. effectiveness, cost, transferability), among others.



We will collect and synthesise **research evidence** on what works in research dissemination through repositories and portals, and on the state of education policy research.



We will carry out **user research** to understand their needs and barriers. **Engaging users** (initially, independent and embedded intermediaries) from the outset will ensure the meta-portal aligns with their expectations. Through design workshops, we will co-develop prototypes and pilot the webbased platform.



KNOWLEDGE BRIDGE

The OECD's **Evidence Web for Education (EWE)** will build **an online resource bank of effective practices in knowledge mobilisation** (*Knowledge Bridge*) to support actors playing an intermediary role between research, policy and practice communities. The Knowledge Bridge will take the form of **a user-friendly portal that provides research-based, practical guidance materials to users in applying effective knowledge mobilisation practices**. The development of the Knowledge Bridge will draw on the cutting-edge research in this domain, as well as the OECD's own research.

What is it?

At the end of its two-year development phase, the resource bank will feature a set of research-based practical tools and other products to improve the use of research evidence.

TOOLS	Standalone instruments that define a specific method or process of knowledge mobilisation. Tools support intermediaries in designing strategies, mapping actors and mechanisms, building and assessing capacity for knowledge mobilisation, evaluating knowledge mobilisation activities or developing policy-research / research-practice partnerships.
	Tool descriptions will be accompanied by support materials such as guidance documents, use cases, guiding questions, methodologies, and implementation plans

How is it developed?

We will map, analyse and select existing, fully-developed knowledge mobilisation tools, and those that are underdeveloped but show a promising research base. Tool descriptions and their supporting materials will be codeveloped with the experts that produced them. We will host a series of expert meetings to co-develop the knowledge mobilisation impact framework and its indicators.

Throughout the Knowledge Bridge development process, we will engage users to collect information on their needs, test prototypes and products, and solicit user feedback.



PEER LEARNING

The OECD's **Evidence Web for Education (EWE)** offers tailored **learning and development activities** for evidence intermediaries (a.k.a. knowledge brokers) to improve the quality, coherence and impact of their knowledge mobilisation efforts. The peer-learning opportunities are intended to **generate collaborative reflection** on identified challenges and **develop intermediaries' capacities based on research and accumulated experience**. EWE complements existing peer-learning efforts, connecting different types of intermediaries across networks and geographical regions.

What is it?

ONLINE WORKSHOPS

Short interactive webinars on specific themes, open to broad participation of embedded and independent intermediaries, held throughout 2025-26.

Workshop formats may include:

Live case studies: a concrete knowledge mobilisation practice is discussed in-depth

Peer-assistance: critical friends offer structured support for a practical dilemma

Ask an expert: interactively assess the latest research on specific aspects of knowledge mobilisation

Potential topics:

- Mapping knowledge mobilisation actors and activities to strengthen coordination
- Using AI tools to improve evidence synthesis and use
- Rapid response mechanisms for concrete policy/practice needs
- Evidence traveling across contexts and systems: transferability and adaption
- Embedding research engagement in teacher education
- Building a new knowledge brokering unit in your ministry

- Aligning knowledge mobilisation with the policy cycle
- How embedded intermediaries can influence highlevel decision-making
- Engaging researchers in policy questions
- Planning knowledge mobilisation: developing a Theory of Change
- Evaluating impact of knowledge mobilisation: indicators and methods
- Scaling up knowledge mobilisation efforts

PEER-LEARNING SEMINARS

Interactive **in-person events** where participants delve deeply into a narrowly defined topic. They unpack it from multiple perspectives through critical inquiry, share experiences on what works and what doesn't, and prototype solutions.

Three two-day seminars will be held in 2025-26, each bringing together around 30 participants from 5 to 7 systems and organisations facing similar challenges. The seminars employ evidence-based methods in small groups and follow a **design-thinking approach**, in a format developed and tested by CERI.

Participants will:

Analyse "knowledge mobilisation journeys" through a concrete case

Engage with national stakeholder/expert panels to exchange practices across sectors and contexts

Discuss and test concrete tools, methods or frameworks (e.g. a simulation model)

Potential themes:

- Scalable approaches to capacity building for research engagement in policy and practice
- Planning, leading and scaling research-practice partnership
- Mapping and coordinating knowledge mobilisation activities across intermediaries and sectors

How is it developed?

To shape a relevant and responsive capacity-building programme, the OECD-EWE team has been mapping the learning needs of intermediaries. Peer-learning **activities will be co-developed** with participants and supported by experts. The team will then produce, share and publish outputs from the events. Finally, to foster community-building among intermediaries between events, the EWE project is also developing **a digital platform for sharing resources**, **exchanging ideas**, **and sparking collaboration**.
