Things You Can Do To Be Loon Friendly

- Obey no-wake law within 200 feet of shore
- Use lead-free tackle
- Dispose of fishing line so it does not get tangled up in a loon's feet or bill.
- Use phosphorus-free fertilizer and plant shrubs as a buffer along the shoreline to reduce run-off.
- If you see a loon on a nest, keep your distance and watch with binoculars.
- Keep garbage out of reach of loon egg predators like skunks and raccoons.

Loon Facts:

Loons in Maine typically sit on eggs from the middle of May through June (though they can also nest later in the summer as well). Eggs take about 29 days to hatch. Because loons build their nests within a few feet of the shore, changes in water levels can cause nest failure by either flooding eggs or stranding nests too far above the water for adults to reach.

Predation is major cause of nest failure. Raccoons, skunks, crows, ravens and herring gulls are major predators of loon eggs and chicks. These scavengers have increased in number due to plentiful human garbage. What you can do: (1) secure garbage cans and do your part to collect any lakeshore litter and (2) keep pet food out of reach of wildlife.



PATHS & WALKWAYS



~managing foot traffic for lake protection~









<u>Purpose:</u> Properly designed pathways direct foot traffic, absorb water, reduce the rate of flow, and protect soil. Pathways can also reduce the potential for erosion and minimize the amount of pollutants flowing from your property into local streams and lakes.


<u>Installation</u>: Install narrow, meandering pathways in high-use areas. Reroute paths that go directly down steep slopes or install steps or waterbars* to break up the slope.

- Ideally, paths should be no more than 3'-4' wide.
- The walking surface should be covered with 3"-4" of material such as Erosion Control Mix, pine needles, bark mulch, crushed stone, wood chips, or other material. This will define the path, guide foot traffic, and reduce soil erosion.
- Paths should be meandering, depending on the slope, to provide opportunities for runoff to disperse into adjacent vegetation.
- If formal pathways do not currently exist, the new paths can be clearly marked with strategic plantings, stones, solar lights, etc. along the edges.

<u>Materials</u>: Contact your local Soil and Water Conservation District for Erosion Control Mix. This is a mix of wood fibers, soil, and gravel, which holds up to runoff and has a natural look. Crushed stone is available from your local gravel pit. One option for pathway materials includes setting stepping stones into a crushed stone base. The crushed stone allows runoff to infiltrate, and the stepping stones are comfortable for bare feet.

<u>Maintenance:</u> To maintain these structures, periodically remove accumulated debris from the surface. Mulched pathways may need to be re-shaped and additional material may be needed to replace what has washed or worn away. Using non-woven geotextile fabric below stone pathways will extend their life.

*Waterbars: Install waterbar "speed bumps" to break up the slope and keep water from concentrating on a pathway. Fill behind with crushed stone to help runoff soak into the ground and direct water into vegetated areas. Rotresistant logs or pressure treated timbers can be used. Extend past the outside edge of both sides of the path and install at a 30-degree angle. Secure the waterbar with large stones on the downhill side and/or pound in with pieces of rebar steel.

Report from Mark A. Caron, Regional Wildlife Biologist

Penobscot Region—Enfield POND FARM WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREA



The Pond Farm WMA; located in Howland, is a 409 acre shallow freshwater marsh with 40 acres of upland buffer and is one of the Department's oldest WMAs. There is a maintained public landing along the Seboeis Road that allows for canoes and small boats to access the wetland. A partially maintained woods road runs along the east side of the WMA and offers views to the wetland and associated marshy habitat.

A drop-inlet water control structure located adjacent to the landing is used for wetland management

on the WMA.

Pond Farm WMA is a favorite of local waterfowl hunters in the fall and also offers birders excellent viewing opportunities during both the spring and fall migrations. Fishing opportunities are focused on both pickerel and bullheads. The wetland also makes for an easy and enjoyable paddle.

Recent work at the WMA has focused on establishing a 4-acre food plot in what has



been referred to as 'the goose pasture'. This field which abuts the wetland was established in the 1980s. Beginning in 2014, an effort was made to plant the field to an herbaceous forage that would benefit a wide variety of upland and wetland dependent wildlife species but with the focus of providing nesting habitat and forage for the waterfowl that utilize the wetland. Adjacent to the goose pasture we conducted a 'feathering of edges' to create a transition layer between field and forest. The goal was to create nesting opportunity in what is now brushy habitat.

Another development that was a long time in coming was the establishment of wild rice in the wetland. Wild rice is a food favorite of dabbling ducks and other aquatic wildlife. Our 'dabblers' (and some 'divers') also benefit from the 17 duck boxes that are located throughout the wetland habitat. These boxes are maintained annually during the winter and Region F biologists also leg band nesting


